The new kings of Georgia

Mackerel swallows state mark

It was a Sunday night at Half Moon Marina in Midway, and iced down in the fish box aboard Joe Bell's boat was a possible state-record king mackerel. Only problem was, there wasn't a certified scale anywhere to be found, and the mega-king was slowly but surely losing weight.

The fish had bottomed out a 50-pound scale on Bell's boat, and the marina's scale

was out of commission.

"We called Wal-Mart, but their scale only went up to 50 pounds." Bell said. "We were calling shrimp companies ... but we couldn't find anyone home."

Then someone mentioned the Mascot Pecan company in Glennville, about 50 miles west of the marina. The owners, Tim and Kenny Tarver, were contacted and agreed to open up the business and weigh the king.

"We took the boat, truck and everything and drove to Glennville," Bell said. "There were about 20 people there waiting with cameras."

At around 9:30 p.m., on the certified scale at the pecan plant, Bell's king weighed 75 pounds, 12 ounces — one of the largest kings to be caught along the East Coast in years.

Bell has submitted the necessary record-catch paperwork to the state. If his king passes muster, as is expected, it would annihilate the present Georgia state record of 63 pounds, 8 ounces set in 1990.

"We knew what the old record was," said Bell, who lives in Statesboro. "I was numb for a couple of days. "I've gotten a bunch of calls, congratulations from people I don't even know."

The catch sent a buzz Northeast through the Florida-Southeast Georgia offshore trolling community. Earlier this year, a 71.89pound king caught off Key West during a Southern Kingfish Association tournament created a similar stir. That king turned out to be an SKA record for a fish caught

during a tournament. Bell, who competes in the Georgia division of the SKA, didn't catch his king during a tournament. He and his son, Jason, had planned to take their Playin' To Win boat to the Gulf Stream on Sunday, June 13, but the ocean was rough. So they decided to troll closer in, around Gray's Reef, about 16 miles off Sapelo Island on the Georgia coast.

"We were just kind of out having a good time," said Bell, who won Senior Angler (over 55) honors in the SKA's Georgia division last year. "We were trying to get something to eat."

The Bells caught a couple of small kings, and then, as Joe was letting out another threadfin herring bait with his reel in freespool, the big

king struck. Bell was using conventional kingfish tackle — Shimano Speedmaster reel, Penn rod, 20-pound-test line and a pair of No. 6 treble hooks.

Then began the frustrating effort to locate a certified scale. "Somebody said it might have

lost a pound or two," Bell said. Spud Woodward, a marine biologist with the Georgia Department of Natural Resources in Brunswick and a tournament kingfisherman himself, theorized it was probably a combination of factors that produced such a heavyweight specimen.
